A CLARION CALL

With this issue of THE CLARION a new periodical enters the field of religious publications. That field may seem overcrowded already but THE CLARION does not intend to be just another publication. It is being published to meet a need not being met by any other publication.

The name has not been chosen carelessly nor without due consideration. A clarion according to the dictionary is an instrument which gives a clear, shrill sound. The verse which is found at the bottom of this editorial page is meant to add emphasis to the name.

The world is filled with many voices and uncertain sounds which heard together bring confusion. The world is in the throes of mortal combat on every side and in every phase of life. Those who can speak with certainty, those who can give a clarion call must give it now or perish in the chaos which threatens to engulf us.

We are determined to make our position as clear as we possibly can so that men will know where to find us and, we trust, stand with us following the path we tread with understanding and assurance. Our clarity and certainty may cause us to be unacceptable to some but we desire to line up with the Word of God and test our doctrine and life by its teaching.

Such folks as these forget that with the inward peace, the gracious fruit of the Spirit, the sweetness and light which are accompaniments of true Bible salvation, there is in the Scripture a continual reiteration of the fact that those who are saved shall experience persecution, be hated of the world and the forces of Satan, be called to endure hardship as good soldiers of Jesus

Christ, and join battle in the conflict of the ages so that when we stand in the presence of our Savior we may say that we have fought a good fight and that we have kept the faith.

THE CLARION is "a monthly devoted to the interests of the Bible Presbyterian testimony". We believe that its pages will appeal to others not particularly interested in the Bible Presbyterian Church but our purpose is to minister to those who are deeply concerned about the witness and future of that Church. THE CLARION is not an official organ; it is published independently by a group of ministers and laymen in whose heart the Bible Presbyterian Church and its witness has a large place.

The pages of THE CLARION will be devoted to a practical presentation of the problems which face the Bible Presbyterian Church.
