Dear Dr. Stonehouses

The Striptures ask the question: Can two walk together except they be agreed? I believe not, My further presence upon the Board of Trustees and my further services as Secretary would therefore be an embarrasement to the majority.

In addition to this, as you repreted again is your speech on Thursday night, (I am not a member of the Christian Reformed Church)"those who understand the full implications of Calvinian are mainly to be found in the Christian Reformed Church". Since you look to them for your doctrinal security, I believe that you men will find your only hope of financial support from that communion. To secure that support, they, naturally, will went reasonable representation in proportion to that support upon the part of their own membership. My further presence on the Beard will only jeopardize the only chance you brethrem have left of continuing the great work of founding the University.

Several other reasons impak my resignation. I shall try to state them briefly:

1. I do not believe that the work can be successfully founded by the sincere, to be sure, but ascendistic disminsel of Dr. Rian by where efforts the work was brought to a practical start; by whose efforts alons, in my judgment, it can be brought to a consummation. This associates of action demonstrates to me an unwillingness upon the part of a najority of the Board to take such practical attitudes as may make possible any University at all,

2. The trend of action has become increasingly away from the purpose and intent of the constitution as I understood it viz: That those who solemaly subscribed to the doctrines set forth in that constitution be regarded as members of the Board and of the Association in good faith whatever their background, rather than an assumption be made as by our President that a document signed by persons from one background be assumed to be sincers, while when it is prayerfully signed by persons of other background, is open to question, at least as to understanding its implications.

ority is incapable of running a University with the many mixes that would have to compose its sincere and Jelviniatic Trustees and Facility, when that leadership has taken part in seaking to bring hereny charges against such a stanch and well-known Calviniat and believer in the Westminster Confession as Gordon H. Clark Ph.D. Dr. Clark had been falsely accused of disloyally to the Reformed Faith because the leadership of our majority charged him with (their own understanding of) the implications of his theological and epistemological positions not because of proven denials of or disloyalty to any provision of the Westminster Confession. Who in Faculty or on Trustees would be safe from such persecution? What University could possibly function in the midst of such division—upon such points?

and his finding the rain and downfall of so desperately needed an institution as a Christian University, the majority of the Board and his leadership, repeatedly refused to take actions which would recure for itself notice friends among Calvinistic and Reformed groups, the which ections were presented as absolutely as essently to the success of the noticent by Dr. Rian. Though this action was unquestionable motivated by the although desire to avoid any corruption of doctrine, its net effect was to guarantee either that the necessary would fail, or at best, be only a small Opliegs without Exhauds or the necessary schools to make the needed Delversity contribution planuod in the Constitution.

Since, therefore, my further remaining with you, would unbarrage you if you have some chance of suncess, and be tentamount to sharing with you the swful responsibility of wrecking so greatly needed an enterine, if your policies should prove to be as they seem to me sealf-destructive, I must in consciouse offer you my resignation herewith.

I pray that if my judgment be wrong, as well it may, and that you may indeed be able to found a true University upon the besia of these policies, I may be given grace to acknowledge my error; and that if this judgment preve right, the majority may be given that grace which was given to the majority on the ligard of Westminster in its early days, so the they may resign and give the membership the opportunity to recall Dr. Rian is sufficient time to save the whole movement from wrockage. (Provided he i willing and available at that time).

Believe me sincere in my conviction that only as Calvinism is applied to every field of exdesvor, only them will the true Scriptus purpose of God for man be made manifest in those fields of endageer; believ me, the, sincere in cordial greatings and prayers for you all from whom I as in this matter divided by sincere convictions
